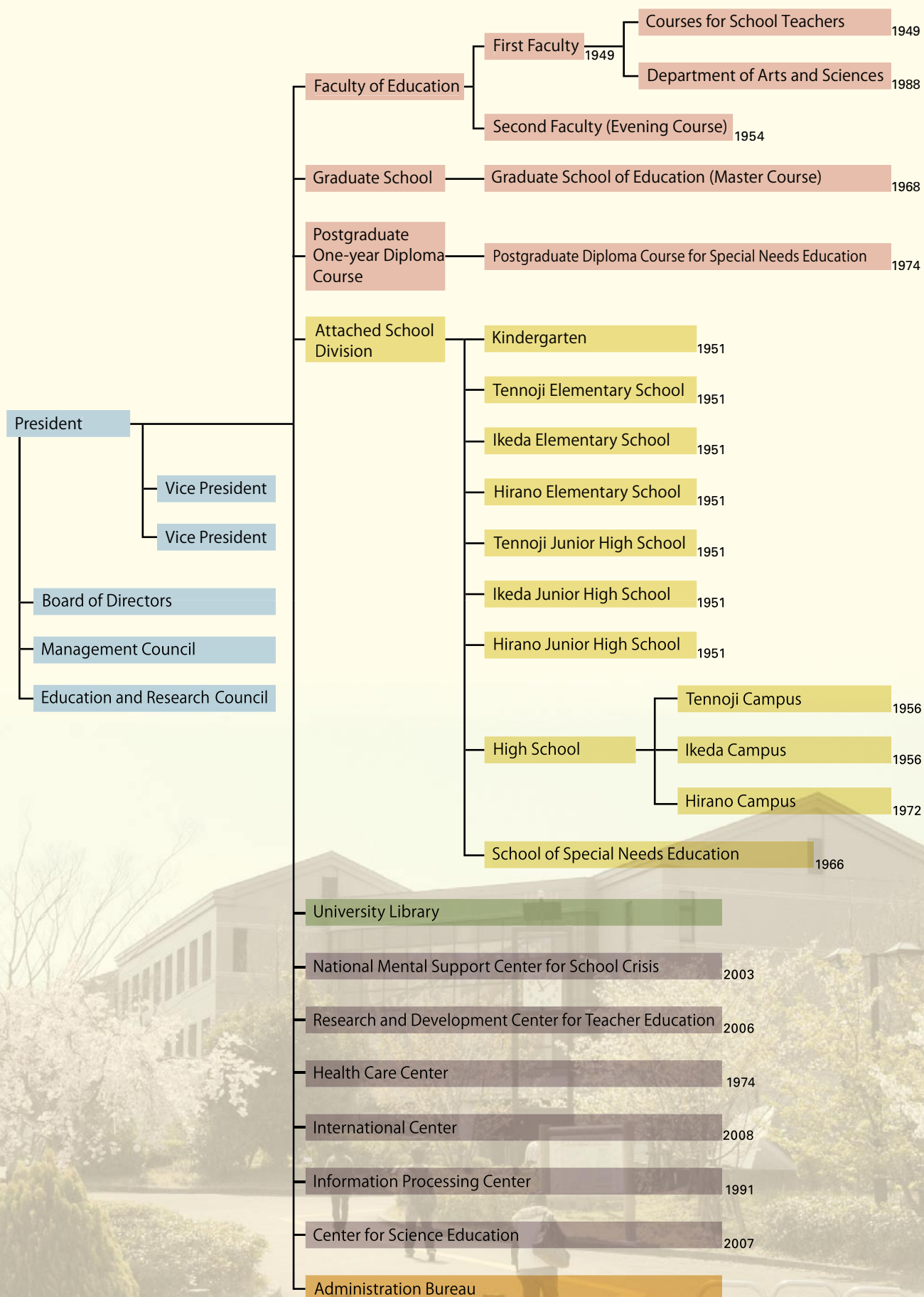

# Outline

Osaka Kyoiku University (OKU) was founded in 1949 as Osaka Gakugei University, incorporating Osaka First and Second Normal Schools under the National School Inauguration Act. The name of Osaka Kyoiku University was later adopted in 1967. In 2004, OKU, like other national universities, was turned into an independent corporate institution.

In accordance with the ethos of the Fundamental Law of Education, and the School Education Law, Since its foundation, OKU has actively promoted educational and research activities for the purpose of educating competent individuals to be intellectually equipped with the relevant knowledge and cultural understanding for the teaching of arts and sciences.

The whole relocation and integration of OKU to Kashiwara City was accomplished in 1993. OKU now offers courses for training elementary school teachers, junior high school teachers, special needs education teachers, nurse teachers and kindergarten teachers, and the Department of Arts and Sciences.

The Tennoji campus offers courses for training elementary school teachers (five- year evening course). Our graduate school (master's course), which comprises 18 majors, is one of the largest graduate schools for teacher training in Japan.

Our programs are designed to meet the high educational standards of a comprehensive teacher training university, and the faculties actively use all institutional resources, including 11 affiliated schools and 6 educational centers.

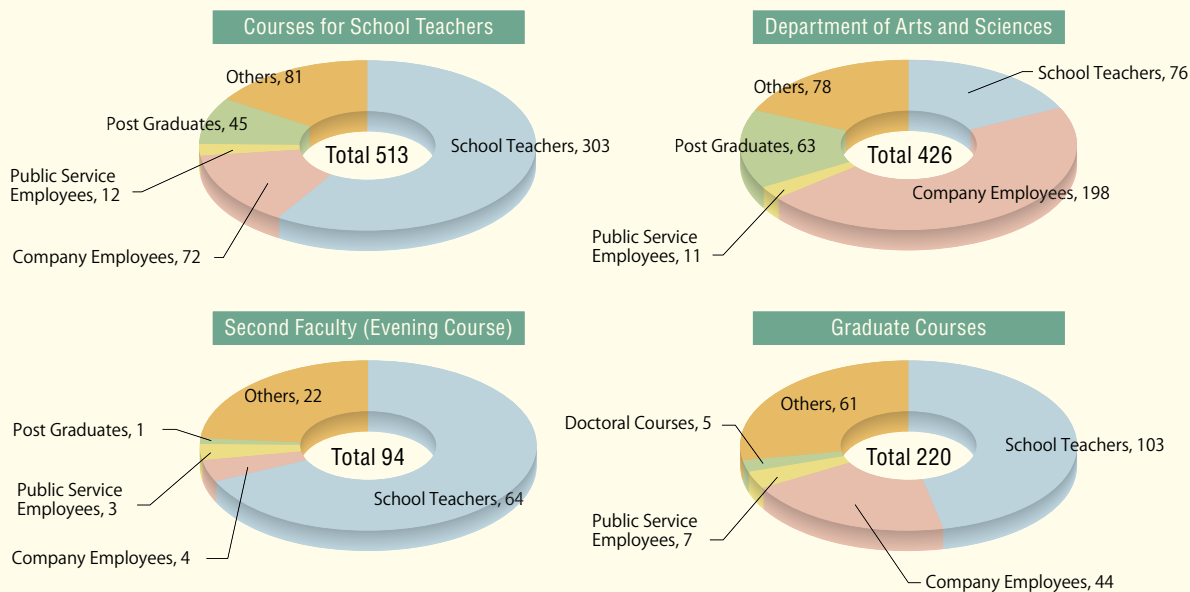

May 1, 2008

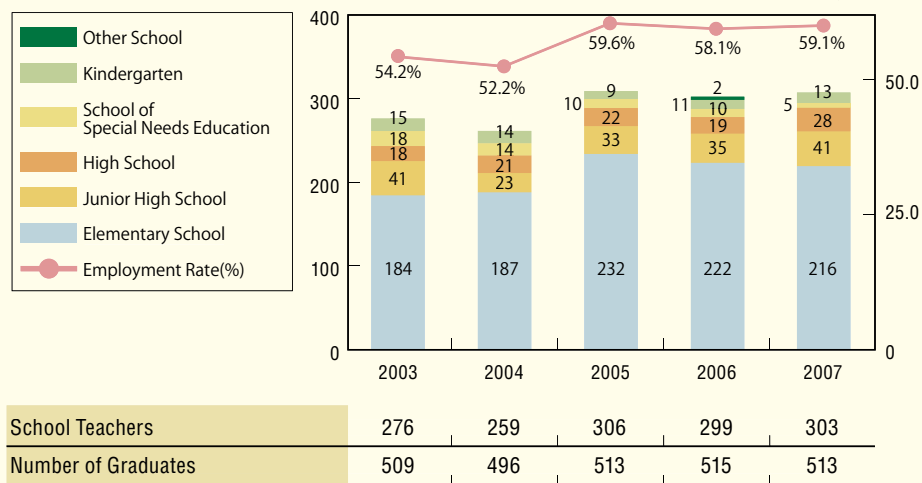

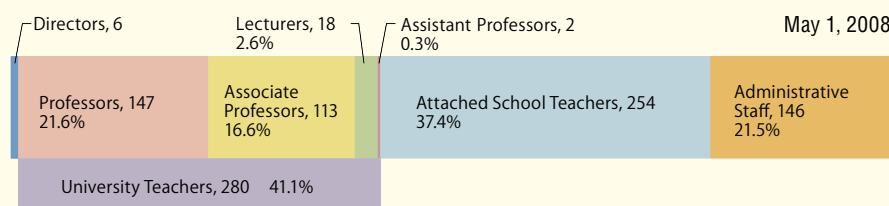

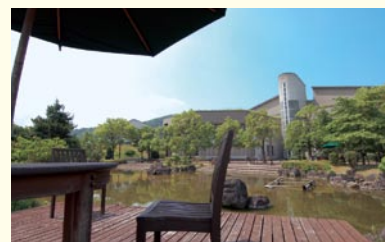

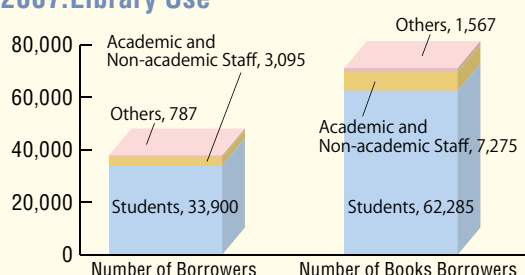

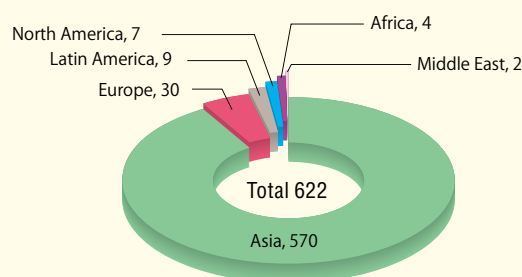

## Number of International Students for the Past Five Years



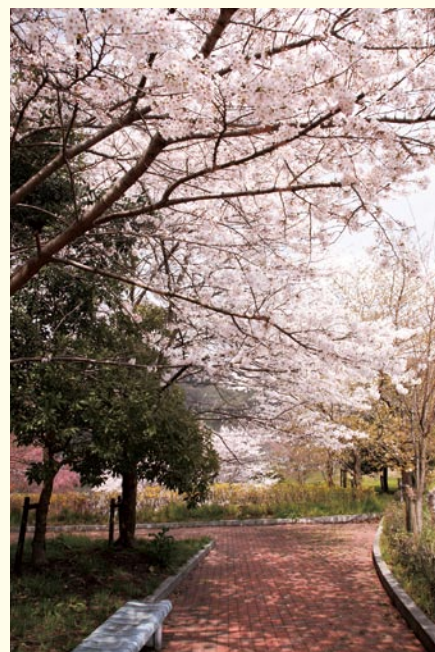
